Holbrook Island Sanctuary State Park encompasses 1,230 acres on the mainland and 115 acres on Holbrook Island. The Park offers trails for walking, hiking, and running (and is also open in the winter for snowshoeing, cross-country skiing and skating on Fresh Pond); bird and wildlife watching; picnic areas; swimming; fishing (salt water); canoe and kayak launch areas; ramps, floats, and moorings at both Tom Cod Cove (mainland) and Holbrook Island (mind the tides); and bicycling on-road. No off-road motorized vehicles are allowed in the Sanctuary. There is no entrance fee at Holbrook Island Sanctuary State Park. Donations are always welcome.

Thoughts from Charlie Cannon



What a difference six months makes...

No, not in our beloved Sanctuary; that remains little changed since Anita Harris donated the land to protect this wonderful micro-corner of Maine, but in the worldwide suppression of the Coronavirus Pandemic. As Spring brings hope eternal, I am writing this with daily good news but not forgetting the toll incurred over the last 16 months. For some of us, the hope is that the increased popularity of outdoor activities will continue to foster an appreciation of nature by people of all ages. Indeed, Holbrook Island finished the year with almost 16,000 visitors; an annual increase of 56%.

We prepared for a Maine winter but were given just a small taste this season. The windstorms were constantly blowing across the Cape from all different directions and we were left with an abnormally large amount of debris to clean up. The annual birdhouse program continues and we delivered to the Maine Discovery Museum, Deer Isle/Stonington Elementary School, the Majabigwaduce Chapter, DAR and Feathers Over Freeport. I assisted crews across the region in varying tasks, and even helped and learned the





in-house production of all State Park signage. Holbrook was rewarded with a few workdays with crews arriving to assist in tree and slash cleanup. All programming and Career Fairs went virtual including the annual First Day Hike; this year we explored around Fresh Pond.

The Bureau of Parks and Lands did deliver on some new equipment including a Ski-Doo, three windows, a chainsaw, leaf-blower, a riding lawnmower and an AED defibrillator. Maine Inland Fisheries and Wildlife came to assess locations of "significant vernal pools" around parking areas throughout the Park. We are relocating the Aaron Trailhead up the hill to a safer and more accessible location and Ned Hildreth rebuilt the Bakeman Farm Trail entrance bridge.







Finally, recently and not seen for many months, school buses delivered groups of happy, adventurous Brooksville Elementary students to explore the picnic area, beaches and Fresh Pond.

The tall ships have brought passengers ashore to stretch their legs; a sign that Spring is breathing new life into us all.

Remembering Phil Farr

February 14, 1938 - March 22, 2021

Phil Farr joined the Maine State Parks system in 1978 and was Manager of your Park for 33 years. He had a vast knowledge and a strong connection to the community. Phil was clearly a selective and thoughtful professor who shared secrets about the Park; others he kept to himself.

Here we are in 2021 tiptoeing around to get things done. Phil's comment about "having to fill out truckloads of paperwork" still rings true.

Phil never got to know Anita Harris well, but he sought to balance her wishes with the purpose and vision of Maine State Parks. He created 90% of the opportunities that exist in our small State Park today. He welcomed overnight groups, developed the birdhouse project and expanded summer programming. Phil's position became seasonal for budget reasons, but he laid out the blueprint for Tammy Bishop and me to regain year-round status at Holbrook.

Phil may have gone quietly but many of us know Phil had some not so quiet words on his way. May he rest in peace with his wife Pat and daughter Kelly forever - and with no more paperwork!





Holbrook Island Sanctuary is open daily, year-round, from 9:00 AM to sunset. Trail maps and bird lists are located in boxes at some of the trailheads. Picnic tables and charcoal grills are located at Park Headquarters, adjacent to the lawn, the beach and in a shady glade. There is one picnic table at the Fresh Pond trailhead. Bring your own charcoal. No alcohol is permitted. No open fires or camping are permitted in the Sanctuary or on Holbrook Island. All dogs must be on a leash and please clean up after your pet. Privy toilets are located near Park Headquarters, at the boat area at Tom Cod Cove and on Holbrook Island.
